Client Story

'Healing yourself is connected to healing others'

Richard is a PWA volunteer and client and he most recently assisted in the collaborative strategic planning process that involved community members, staff, clients and board members. Richard's story is particularly representative of one of PWA's strategic planning directions in which we intend to further focus on engagement.



Before contracting HIV, Richard fled a verbally abusive and homophobic stepfather for the big city, Vancouver. He struggled with homelessness and unemployment. Eventually, he was able to get himself established in a successful retail position. During this secure stage of his life, Richard's mother died. He coped by working and partying hard. The resulting substance addiction of this loss frames the point in time when Richard contracted HIV. Ironically, having had a roof over his head, a career and financial stability, Richard found himself at a new low as an HIV-positive man. Soon after his sero-conversion, he became very ill and was unable to continue working.

Facing incurable illness, career loss, financial hardship, stigma and isolation accompanying the HIV infection, Richard moved to Toronto and encountered the Toronto People With AIDS Foundation. He became a client of PWA because he was struggling to survive. "I came in for a bag of food'. Initially he was afraid to visit PWA's office and the elevator to our second floor office was a particularly anxious hurdle to tackle. Richard says "pressing the button was the best decision I ever made". Like many of our new clients, Richard left our office holding his head high.

Because of the programs and services he accessed at PWA, Richard says he has "had the opportunity to rebuild my confidence and work skills". In addition to food he first came to PWA for, Richard found much needed peer support and opportunities to be engaged.

At PWA, "I met people who got it. I felt understood, heard'. He was invited to hear a speaker "...and I listened. And it got me thinking, if they could do it...survive all that, why couldn't I?" Shortly thereafter he became a volunteer and a speaker with PWA's Speakers Bureau. "I connected with a PWA staff member who became a mentor for me. I attribute my going back to school to his support".

Richard is one of 12 volunteers with the Speaker's Bureau. He speaks about HIV prevention to university, college and high school students and about how they can protect themselves from HIV. Community services <u>are</u> the bridges that help people find their way out of crisis, out of the poverty cycle, and out of homelessness.

I've found that helping others and, being in service, has been very healing. I've been able to make a positive impact on the way health care if delivered as a result of being meaningfully engaged.
